Discussion on current COVID educational environment	1. Program faculty discussed how the current semester has been going with COVID-19 with courses, lab partners, and difficulty with students missing class due to quarantine.
Report from Program Director, Program outcomes, and demographics	 1. Program demographics and outcomes were discussed: -Until this year Employment rate was still high, 2020 graduates are having more difficulty finding employment, but more positions have become available in the past couple of months and more alumni are reporting better success. -Of the 17 students who started in Fall we still have 12. A majority of the 5 who withdrew were due to non-academic reasons.
	-Applications are down. 9 admitted for next fall, but still talking with a lot of prospective students.
	-recruiting: several high schools would like us to do this
	2. Reviewed PEAT scores for the spring, scores were decreased from the past several years.
