3. **Business Case:** What are the issues/challenges/problems/opportunity that this proposal will provide a solution for? Will it provide improved efficiency for the college for the benefit of students or the community?

Existing labs do not adequately replicate the real-world healthcare environments, limiting students' ability to transition smoothly from classroom to clinical and work environments. The lack of simulation tools provides students with fewer opportunities to safely practice skills before working with patients, or requires students to travel upwards of 120 miles to travel to the nearest campus with capabilities. The current nursing lab lacks high-fidelity simulation equipment. The current space lacks the integration of healthcare informatics with system processes such as electronic health records and electronic medication dispensing systems. Outdated space further restricts the ability to expand enrollment or accommodate multiple programs. This capital investment will provide improved efficiency for the college by modernizing facilities, standardizing training, and expanding capacity. For students, the improved environment will mean higher-quality preparation, stronger employment prospects, and safer patient care. For the community, it ensures a steady pipeline of well-prepared healthcare professionals to meet regional needs.

The nursing programs at Northland have a longstanding commitment to preparing highly skilled graduates who are prepared to enter the workforce and meet the healthcare needs of NW MN. The current lab space is outdated and does not reflect the current state of modern healthcare environments; further, it lacks high-fidelity simulation equipment altogether. The identified needs center on providing students access to facilities that mirror current clinical settings, incorporate healthcare informatics, and allow for safe, realistic simulation-based learning. Prior action has been taken to address these needs; faculty and staff have adapted available space to maximize the use of low or mid-fidelity simulation experiences in the current environment. By upgrading the TRF nursing lab and simulation space, Northland will be better equipped to prepare students, enhance patient safety training, and strengthen the healthcare workforce pipeline vital to the region's communities serving rural NW MN. Previous grant requests to update the space have been completed in the past with the grant not being awarded to Northland.

Yes, the current 2 "patient" rooms for mid-level simulation were enhanced 15 or so years ago. There have been grant opportunities that were sought by the previous administration.
